





Planning Update

Crest Nicholson's outline planning application was approved at WBC's Planning Committee on 25 March. The planning application for the new secondary school was also approved at the same committee meeting. Meanwhile the MFT application for the southern part of the site is expected to go to the Planning Committee in September: there appears to be no big issue causing the delay, rather a matter of resolving a number of small ones.

Crest Nicholson have also revealed an initial concept for the first phase of building. This will be the "Lakeside" neighbourhood, located on the east side of the existing lake off Biggs Lane. Building is expected to commence around Christmas this year with the first residents moving in by summer 2016.

Crest Nicholson indicated that they will carry out a public consultation before finalising a name for the development. They do appreciate that this matter needs to be resolved for their own commercial purposes. However they have not confirmed when or how they will do this: my expectation is that they will propose a short list of preferred names that hopefully will have some local association.

Arborfield and Barkham Neighbourhood Plan Greenways Project

Since I became involved in the greenways project, it has become

very clear that a great many residents are keen to use local footpaths and bridleways. The best known routes, not surprisingly, are the best used. However there seems to be a lack of awareness of other routes.

Did you know that you can walk all the way from Barkham to California Country Park? There are footpaths all the way, mainly using cross country footpaths, with just a couple of stretches on pavements alongside the main roads. The Leopard Bus can bring you back to Barkham, though not on Sundays.

Did you know that you can walk all the way to Sindlesham across country? A visit to the cricket ground in Sadlers Lane or a walk to the Walter Arms are feasible.

Did you know that you can walk all the way through The Coombes from Coombes Lane to Arborfield Cross? Come back on the Leopard Bus if you don't feel like walking both ways!

Did you know that there are many circular walks within the parish especially within The Coombes? Though parts of these routes are well used, their full potential is not well appreciated.

The focus of the Greenways Group so far has been on developing a comprehensive plan: As many of these ideas will be relatively long term projects, it was felt that some attention should be given to ideas that can be made ready more quickly. In particular it should be am aim to make better use of the various footpaths and bridleways that are already in existence.

Specifically we are investigating ways in which we can improve signposting and to prepare local maps that can be downloaded from websites. To make this

happen we will have to find a modest amount of expenditure, which it is hoped can be covered by development funds. Also we will need to co-operate with WBC on various matters. Ihope to give you an update on this project in due course.

For readers who fancy a little exploration, here are some directions for the route to California Country Park:

Walking to California

- Starting from the bottom end of Sandy Lane, turn right along Barkham Road, heading down the hill.
- A short distance along, a footpath is signposted to the left. Follow this path which will bring you to Edney's Hill.
- Cross Edney's Hill and follow another signposted path across the fields which will eventually reach Barkham Church.
- Continue left around the outside of the churchyard and you will reach a path heading south along the edge of the field. This is a new path and will take you towards Rooks Nest Country Park.
- Enter the park through a gateway. At this point the path becomes gravel with some boardwalk sections across wetter areas.
- After a short distance you will reach a Tjunction with another pathway. Turn right and follow the path all the way to the car park.
- Go through the car park and turn left along Barkham Ride. There is a new pavement along this stretch of road.
- Reaching the built up area, cross Barkham Ride and follow a signposted bridleway.
- Continue along this bridleway and when it eventually turns right, there is an entrance to California Park.
- Continue through the park to Nine Mile Ride, where there is a bus stop, if returning on the Leopard bus.
- The total one way distance from Sandy Lane to Nine Mile Ride is approximately 2 miles.

Borough Councillor's end of term report

My commitment is wholeheartedly to a good quality of life for all residents and having served in the privilege position as the elected member for Barkham for the last 4 years on Wokingham borough council. I have strived to ensure the delivery and quality of services meet and where possible exceed the best possible standards as well as reflecting what residents want. At the same time ensuring we do not destroy what we have and enjoy, living as we do in what is a great place, Barkham.

So it is with great pleasure I can report I have been elected by you the residents of Barkham to serve on the borough council representing the electorate for another 4 years, which I intend to do to the best of my ability.

I felt it was important to explain in my end of term report the budget constraints the borough council has been put under and cover off what is the latest news with regards the Garrison development. The other important issue is what's going on with the roads around the borough, something which touches us all almost every day and has a major impact on our lives.

Garrison Development (Arborfield)

The MOD (Crest Nicholson) Planning Application for up to 2000 houses, over 75% of which falls in Barkham and the one submitted by the council for the new secondary school both of which have been approved, the garrison in outline and a full application for a state of the art secondary school which is on target to open in September 2016. Part of the plan will be additional greenways and the housing development will cover less than 50% of the available land meaning over 50% will be green spaces.

The secondary school is very important to me as I have been fighting for this for many years both as a parish and borough councillor and will mean children in our area starting secondary school after next will no longer be require to be bussed or travel around the borough to go to school.

The decision in principle to develop the garrison and surrounding land was made many years ago, before I was elected to represent Barkham and there was always the question would the army actually move as it had been mooted many times over the last 20 to 30 years, now this is certain I have been working with residents, officers of the council and developers to ensure what is delivered is of good quality and the infrastructure provided brings improvements to not only new residents but all existing people living around the development.

The first application for the garrison site was submitted and was subsequently withdrawn by the applicant at the request of the council because of it did not reach the standards expected and I was actively involved in getting the plan thrown out.

No rise in council tax

Wokingham remains the lowest

funded unitary authority in England with regards to the level of government grant it receives and despite the on-going austerity programme, on (February 19th); full council was asked to agree a council tax freeze for 2015/16. It was agreed, voted for by me and the rest of my Conservative colleagues. The council has seen a 10.5% reduction in the government settlement funding assessment-equating to £2.9million in real terms when compared with last year. I have been fighting along with other members of the council for greater efficiencies to enable the cost burden on residents to be held at its current level for at least the next 12 months

Even so the council is set to continue investing, with £95.8 million in capital projects next year, to support its priorities including new schools, roads and housing and despite the financial pressures we continue to focus on maintaining good quality services.

Included in the investments planned for 2015-20

New schools including a first class secondary school in Barkham on the Arborfield garrison site in the south of the borough, planned to be delivered in 2016, new primary schools in the strategic development locations

Five new roads including Arborfield Relief Road, North Wokingham Distributor Road, South Wokingham Distributor Road, Shinfield Eastern Relief Road, Nine Mile Ride extension and the Winnersh Relief Road.

Roads

Wokingham borough has the highest ratio of car ownership in the country - only 9% of local households are without one, in addition car ownership in the Borough is also one of the highest nationally for households having two or more cars.

Wokingham borough's road network has the unique problem of serving this high level of car ownership, which means it's trickier to maintain and upgrade without causing problems and congestion, that said the level of car ownership is central to the council policies on infrastructure.

Investment in the borough's highways infrastructure and maintenance between 2015-2018 will, in addition to the major roads a program to replace the borough's worn out streetlights, four additional footbridges over the Waterloo railway line and a replacement railway bridge (Guildford and Waterloo lines) on the A321 Finchampstead Road, the extension to Nine Mile Ride and a new relief road at Arborfield, in addition to junction upgrades and new junctions and road improvements such as the new station link road and changes to Barkham bridge, where required.

There is also planned investment in future and current cycle networks as part of the development of greenways (a network of quiet community and leisure routes for pedestrian's, cyclists and horse riders) and public rights of ways. We have plans for 2 new park and rides with future plans for additional locations, and will be looking to extend the destinations served by these park and rides.

We will also be investing heavily on measures to keep traffic moving to negate as much as possible the effects of these works on road Thank you users whether vehicles, bicycles or pedestrian.

So far we have secured over £40m in government grants to enable to deliver the infrastructure the borough needs, this is in addition

to the tens of millions of pounds from developers building new homes in the borough.

Barkham much like other areas in Wokingham and the rest of the southeast suffers from traffic congestion and this is not helped by the amount of utilities work which requires road works. In 2013/14 over 9,000 notifiable pieces of work were carried out on Wokingham's roads by utility companies and the Council. In order to try to co-ordinate these works a system exists whereby works promoters have to inform the Council what they are going to do and when. This is done within a relatively strict set of rules and there are penalties for not adhering to these rules.

To strengthen the powers which the council has to control such works the council since January have implemented a new permit system, It will not just tell us that works are going ahead but will mean utilities companies have to ask the council for permission to carry out those works. In addition if they wish to vary the time that they are on site they will incur a cost – thus encouraging them to plan properly in the first place.

Again thank you for the support I have received over the past 4 years and it has been a privilege to represent you all and now having been re-elected I look forward to the task ahead and although we are making progress at the Borough council we still have a long way to go and with many challenges in front of us all.

Local mum's campaign for a life changing drug for her son

I am campaigning for the NHS to fund a "life-changing" drug for my 10-year-old son suffering from a rare genetic disorder.

He is William Reeves, of Hayes Lane, Barkham and has Morquio Syndrome, a metabolic disorder which mainly affects his growth. There are just 78 sufferers of the syndrome in England. Now 10 and just 2ft 5ins tall, I am the rest of William's family are desperate for access to Vimizim, the only enzyme replacement therapy drug to address the cause of Morquio.

Not currently funded by the NHS, Vimizim is only available to those lucky enough to get on a clinical trial, William was not so fortunate. However even that lifeline may be cut off due to NHS bureaucracy. To get this drug would be life-changing, He hasn't grown since he was about three. Life expectancy with this condition on average is 25, we need action now.

William, who is a pupil at St Teresa's Catholic Primary School in Wokingham, was diagnosed when he was three after I noticed he was not developing as fast as his older sister Jessica, 12, had or other children his age.

I was always being told to go away but after some time I thought enough so I went along to the doctors and asked to be referred to a private consultant. Again I was told I was being emotional but this time I refused to leave..

Eventually William was diagnosed at Great Ormond Street Hospital where we met another boy suffering from the same

nate enough to get on a trial for Vimizim.

He (the other little boy) is doing very well,. He has grown and looks like a 10-year-old. We are desperate for him to get the drug so he can enjoy a better life. He is marvellous; he is so confident and very special.

The campaign

William joined campaigners to deliver a letter to Prime Minister David Cameron on Wednesday, March 11. The protest was led by a number of charities campaigning for access to the drugs children desperately need. Charities included the MPS Society, Tuberous Sclerosis Association, Action Duchenne, Harrison's Fund and others.

NHS England was forced to scrap its drugs commissioning process in December because of the threat of legal challenge that it was discriminatory. Until a new process is in place, campaigners are demanding NHSEngland provide interim funding to access the drugs.

Greg Mulholland MP, who is leading the cross-party multi-organisation campaign, questioned Mr Cameron at Prime Minister's Question Time before dropping off a letter with William at 10 Downing Street to add further pressure on Mr Cameron.

> Mr Mulholland said: "These children and their families have been let down and fobbed off by NHS England for too long and just aren't getting answers from NHS England. We will keep up the pressure until we get the interim funding these children desperately need."

GEORGE ALFRED ROBINS passed away on Monday 23rd February at the age of 98. He was born at 3 Coppid Hill Cottages, on the corner of Barkham Road and Bearwood Road, where he spent his whole life. George is likely to have been the oldest Barkham resident and we are thankful that he has been able to share his life with us so that there is a record of how Barkham was at the beginning of the 20th century, For this we are very grateful.

He was the youngest of 7 children, 6 boys and a girl, born to William and Jane Robins on the 3rd June 1916. His father and grandfather came out from London and both worked for Daultons and then went on to work in the local brickworks surrounding Wokingham. After retiring George's grandfather went on to work for the re-mount depot at Arborfield. George's mother as well as bringing up 7 children, helped with the births of and the laying out following the deaths of people living locally. His fatherdrove a pony and trap and would fetch the midwife who lived in a cottage opposite Wokingham Hospital. George's

mother's parents ran The Raglan pub in Denmark Street.

George can remember the cottages being lit with paraffin lamps and candles. He could not remember when gas and electricity was installed but he did enjoy central heating in his old age. The water pump was across the Barkham Road and so was their original garden, Barkham Road being a track running between.

George attended Arborfield School and played football for the school team, he left school at 14. He said that the surrounding countryside was a boy's paradise as well as enjoying football he used to enjoy a good paper-chase, and climbing a big holly tree in Aggisters Lane. In a field close to Barkham Church he and his friends built a tree house the tree was recorded as a veteran oak in 2010 but blew down in a storm in February 2014. George also enjoyed catching rabbits using ferrets and his dog called Toots who was a dab hand at catching the rabbits. One day the dog caught a rabbit and brought it back to George's mother who was on her way to the village shop. She popped the rabbit in her basket and it promptly jumped out again only to be caught by the dog and brought back again this time dead.

George began his working life at 'Fords the Corn Merchants' in Peach Street then Sale Tilney an agricultural engineering company. He then went on to work at C F Taylor Industrial, in Molly Millars Lane, as a fork lift driver. After being made redundant he went to work at The Guide Dog Centre as a groundsman where he carried on working after his retirement. George tells the story about dogs who the Guide Dog Centre was unable to train and who would eventually be rejected by the organisation and adopted by others. George found a way to quieten these dogs if they became aggressive and that was by feeding them horse hoof trimmings which he got from the Blacksmith at the original Bull at Barkham pub. He said that there was a mineral in the hoof which helped to calm the dogs and it worked because George was the only person who could get near these dogs.

At the outbreak of World War 2 George enlisted in the Royal Army Service Corps (RASC) branch in Reading and was sent first to Sheffield and then Slough (next to the Mars factory) for training. George then served in Egypt or, as George put it, 'Chasing Rommel'. His military time was spent in the RASC driving all types of Military vehicles; George had many stories to tell and enjoyed his time in the army. A memory he always cherished was when he was demobbed and returned to his home his dog who was still alive but very elderly tottered out of his basket to greet George.

After leaving the army George methis wife Ruth, a local girl who was in service at Barkham Rectory with The Reverend Ditchfield. Ruth was the daughter of a baker and she became a very good cook and cake maker. They married at St James Church in August 1947. They had three sons David, Peter and Simon.

His enthusiasm for the game of football never faded and it was football that was to change his fortunes when in the 1960s he won the pools and bought a black and white TV, a second hand black Ford Popular car and the black coal hole attached to the cottage was turned into a bathroom.

George told me that he had met royalty on two separate occasions. The first time was when a horse race was being run at Arborfield Garrison and the then Prince of Wales fell off his horse right in front of him. The second time he was visiting Sandhurst and was walking with a colleague through a workshop area where there were two men and a lady leaning over an engine with their heads under the bonnet of a truck. George commented to his colleague that the lady had nice legs and his colleague said you do know who that is, don't vou. It was Princess Elizabeth during the time she was working at Sandhurst during WW2.

George also remembered watching the stonemason cut the words "Post Office" across the building in Broad Street and the then owner of Broad Street who had straw and sawdust laid along the entire length of the road to stop the noise of the cart wheels because his wife was seriously ill and he didn't want the noise from the cart wheels to keep her awake.

George loved his garden and up until about five years ago grew

flowers and vegetables he also grew onions and once won a prize at the Arborfield Gardening show for the largest onions and had his photo in the local paper. George's other speciality was hanging baskets; a magnificent sight which everyone admired. His "green fingers" drew all sorts of local residents to buy his bedding plants and when he was unable to garden any more he would sit in the sunshine and enjoy watching the birds.

George and his brother David were pigeon fanciers with the Wokingham Club and they were very successful both locally and internationally. On Sunday afternoons it was a regular sight for the neighbours to see the pigeons flying around.

George remembered when the council houses were built the other side of Barkham Bridge in 1921, now known as Bridge Cottages. Mr Maurice Cox lived in number 1 and Mr Batt who was the blacksmith lived in number 6.

In 1997 Ruth died at home, after a short illness through which George cared for her with the kindness and support of Ann, his sister-in-law who was also his next door neighbour. Ann was there to help him through this sad time and when life became bearable again he would spend his time in the garden and greenhouse growing fruit and vegetables. He had just as much pleasure growing his fruit and vegetables as he did giving them away to friends and family that popped into see him. I would often come home from work to find a box of vegetables and during strawberry season large punnets which were very delicious.

Ann has also been there for George as he got older and would buy his paper each day, cook his lunches and sit and have a cup of coffee as a daily ritual. They both enjoyed each other's company and have been a great support for each other over the years.

We got to know George and Ruth when the hedge between us died. We would talk in the garden when they fed the chickens and slowly got to know them both. When Ruth died we would visit George and sit in the kitchen or in the garden when the sun was out because he loved to sit and watch the birds and they returned this love by nesting all over his garden and enjoying the treats he put out for them.

It is wonderful that George was able to remain at home until the last few days of his life and still be able to get out in to the garden when the weather improved, he was saddened that he was unable to continue to grow his tomatoes and that the greenhouse had overgrown but he had wonderful memories which kept him going. If he was sitting in the garden when I got home from work then he would wave when he spotted me so his eyesight remained good up to the end.

George was a very special gentleman and his family and friends are going to miss him very much George has made a very huge impression on a lot of people especially myself and I thank him for all those wonderful chats we had and all the wonderful things he was able to tell me about his life and how full it had been.

Arborfield Gardening Association

Hello Everyone !

AGA continues to flourish, with some well-attended meetings & excellent speakers

Patricia Elkington came to our March meeting to talk about the National Gardens Scheme. Patricia has assessed gardens for suitability to be included in the National Gardens Scheme & opens her own garden for the scheme at Little Court in Winchester. Her intriguing topic, "The Secret Gardens of Hampshire" was most amusing & very well received. Another fun mini competition of animal pictures was won by Patsy Townsend.

In April Marcus Dancer, a Nurseryman from Fordingbridge, visited us to talk to about his specialist area of Clematis. He had brought an amazing selection of clematis for demonstration, which we were later able to purchase at enticingly low prices. Marcus also judged our Spring Show-the Spring Challenge Cup being won by Patsy Townsend.

Marcus is aware of the confusion that can exist regarding the various types of clematis and the difficulty in deciding which clematis will succeed in particular locations, so he divided his talk into the different clematis groups, tempting us with enlarged photographs of the plants in flower. Some plants require burying to 3 or 4 inches beneath the level they are in the purchased pot, to prevent clematis rot, others do not. He advised us how to treat clematis rot and gave us a simple guide on how to prune clematis if the label was lost: generally any

clematis that flower on the previous year's growth before June, should not be pruned; clematis that flower on the current year's growth from June onwards, should be hard pruned immediately after flowering. Propogate plants from cuttings of the current year's growth. More specific information can be found on his website : www.clematisplants. <u>co.uk</u> – scroll down through the list of suppliers to "Clematis Catalogue from Marcus Dancer in Hampshire". There you will also find a list of Farmers Markets & plant shows he attends & where you can pick up any plants you have ordered from him - Alton Farmers' Market being the closest to our area. His phone number (01425652747) & address can also be found there.

May was a busy month, with our very popular Plant Sale, where some good quality indoor & outdoor plants, produced by professional gardeners, were on sale at competitive prices. But not to worry – there will be another opportunity to buy plants you can be assured will grow well in this area, on our stall at the Arborfield Summer Fair in Arborfield Park on Saturday 6th June.

Our summer outdoor visits begin with June's meeting on 11th - an afternoon visit (2pm) to the Living Rain Forest, Hampstead Norreys, RG18 0GN. This will include a guided tour & cost £8:95 per person (less if there are 16 or more of us). By car, the Living Rainforest is approximately 30 minutes from Reading. You can follow brown tourist information signs from the A34 / M4 Junction 13 intersection, which is about 10 minutes away. There is a bus service from Newbury to the nearby village of Hampstead Norreys.

July's visit on 9th will be at our usual time of 7:30pm & is a visit to the Conservation Lake at Theale. Catherine McEwan will be our guide & there is no charge for this event. The Theale Gravel Pits are situated astride the M4 between junctions 11 and 12 and south of the A4 in Reading. Three complexes of various sized gravel pits are spread out across the Theale flood plain. It is one of Berkshire's finest and most important birdwatching areas. Parking is limited, but the Fox and Hounds Pub allow parking as long as there is room for customers, so car sharing is appreciated. Our Summer Concert includes one of the most popular pieces written by Sibelius. "Finlandia" continues our celebration of 150 years since the composer's birth. The virtuosic Violin Concerto No.1 by Paganini is also on the programme and will feature the gifted young Brazilian violinist, Leon Keuffer as soloist. When the concerto was premiered, Paganini himself was soloist. The audience were astonished at the technical skill involved in performing the concerto. Later it was revealed that Paganini cheated a bit, using surreptitious wizardry to achieve what was thought to be impossible. He tuned his violin a semitone higher than normal and wrote the violin part in a different key from the orchestral part so it sounded in the same key but made it possible to achieve effects impossible with the normal tuning! Later the concerto was re-written in a different key which made it possible to play without such underhand tricks

but it remains a very demanding piece for the soloist.

Shostakovich wrote his Symphony No 5 during the 'Great Terror' of Stalin's Russia and like many of his fellow countrymen he lived in fear of his life if he failed to toe the official line. This symphony has become one of his most popular works and he succeeded in appearing to write a pro-government work whilst in reality he was hiding within the music feelings of grief and fear and 'forced' exultation. It has come to light in recent years that it also has references to a failed love affair! It is a most exciting piece of music both to play and to listen to and will involve probably the largest number of musicians the CSO has ever had on the stage of The Old Gym. We will even need to have an extension to the stage to fit everyone on!

The concert is at The Old Gym, Wellington College, on Saturday



11th July starting at 8pm. Tickets are on sale at Bookends in Wokingham and at Traveltime in Crowthorne at £10 or on the door at £12 (subject to seats being available). They can also be purchased on-line via our website for a small booking fee. As usual children of 16 years and under are free.



In July our monthly meeting on Monday 6th will include a talk by Kevin Little entitled "The History of Smelly Alley, Reading". I'm sure most of you will know exactly where that is: if not, please just ask.

We are always pleased to welcome visitors to our regular meetings, all we ask is a nominal £2-00 per head but why not consider joining our Society where annual membership starts at £5-00. The months of June and July bring their historical anniversaries..... June 16th will be the 100th anniversary of the foundation of the Women's Institute and the 18th marks 200 years since the Battle of Waterloo took place. More recently, just ten years ago on July 10th 2005 there were a series of four explosions on London's transport system which killed 56 people including 4 suicide bombers. On a different note, July 5th 1865 marks the date, 150 years ago, that The Salvation Army was founded by William Booth in London's East End. The Booth family were a fundamental part of the Salvation Army and four of William's grandchildren are buried locally in the churchyard of St James, Finchampstead.

Now for a snippet of local history. We have recently been contacted by a splendid gentleman who told us about his ancestors who lived for a while in Arborfield. It is always such a delight to learn more about the people who lived here before us. In this case the people in question were Thomas and Sarah Webb. Thomas and his wife Sarah were married in 1785 and arrived in Arborfield, with their four children, in about 1794. Thomas was a papermaker and with his partner John Love owned Arborfield paper mill until 1810 when their partnership was dissolved.

During their time in our village, Thomas and Sarah had two more children, William who was baptised in December 1794 and Lettice in June 1797, both at St Bartholomew's Church (the old church-now in ruins). On the day that William Webb was born, 1st December 1794 at 10.45am, there occurred "the greatest flood ever remembered on the river Loddon". Things are changing. They always do!

We are changing our name and logo. From later this year we will are dropping the 'Bureau' part of our name and we will become 'Citizens Advice'. Our new logo looks like this:

We are also trying to change the way we work and improving peoples' access to us. We are trying hard (along with the other 5 CABx in Berkshire) to find funding for more Berkshire wide services, such as email, web chat, more outreaches and more home visiting. The only problem here is that this type of funding is often targeted at city centres where there are high levels of deprivation, and not the 'leafy lanes' of Wokingham. Before you write to me I know that not all the lanes in Wokingham are 'leafy', and that there are real pockets of severe deprivation around here. Believe me, we have the evidence!

We have just finished another year in March. In the last year we helped 4,429 unique clients (we only count a person once during the year, no matter how many times they visit or contact us) with 7,753 new problems. We helped people with debts totalling over £5.25 million and sent 128 detailed evidence reports (details of issues where we think that laws or practices are unfair - based on client evidence).





From Barkham we saw 77 unique clients (there were 74 last year) that had 142 problems that they needed help with. This support for them cost the bureau £3,619 with the Borough Council contributing £2,895. The remaining £724 we cover by a grant from Barkham Parish Council and by fundraising.
