An Update from Barkham Parish Council

Firstly, Barkham Parish Council would like to express its sadness of the news that Stewart Richardson, a long-standing member of the BVRA Committee has passed away. Stewart gave so much of his time to the BVRA, and keeping residents aware of development issues in the parish. Our condolences go to his family and friends. He will be missed by us all.

Changes to Barkham Parish Council's input to the magazine

The parish council is proposing changes to its regular contribution to the Barkham Village Residents Association Newsletter. The regular planning article will in future be published in the Village Info magazine which is distributed free of charge to all households in Barkham, including Arborfield Green, to ensure maximum exposure of key planning issues. This will be replaced by a regular 'Update from Barkham Parish Council' which could include interim planning updates if the two publications appear at different times.

Planning

Hopefully by now you will have seen the article in the Jul/Aug 2022 edition of Village Info – Local Plan Update – which speculates how the change of leadership of Wokingham Borough Council following the recent local elections may affect the Local Plan. There is concern that new homes across the Borough may be redistributed and that further delays could allow developers, on appeal, to be granted approval for additional sites. Both of these scenarios would have serious implications for Barkham as discussed in the article.

With this in mind, Barkham Parish Council has already written to the new leadership expressing these views and supporting the goal of reducing the number of new houses. A letter has also been sent to Greg Clark who has recently been appointed Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities in a similar vein. With the formation of a new government in Westminster after 05 Sep 2022, we may have to resend this letter if there is another Secretary of State! Both these letters can be found on the Barkham Parish Council website.

Volunteers from the Parish Council and local community turned up to help plant the trees along with Wokingham Borough Council Contractors. It is hoped that the trees will add to the character of the area and encourage biodiversity.

Annual litter pick resumes in Barkham

After a two-year break due to Covid, the annual litter pick in Barkham resumed this year. The event took place on Sunday 3rd April 2022, and volunteers met at the Barkham Village Hall to be assigned a road or area to clear of litter.

Several groups of volunteers turned up to litter pick around the area of Barkham and whilst there were less volunteers than in previous years, there was also less litter to be collected on the roads that were cleaned. A total of 27

- Wokingham Borough's success in defending appeals by landowners in the Coombes –helping to preserve the character of the Coombes.

Energy in Crisis

The average energy bills in the UK, per household, are expected to rise by over£1,500 this year. The financial impact on the poor and vulnerable will be crippling, and the number of those in the UK in fuel poverty will increase. This will have a ripple effect on the health, nutrition, and wellbeing of people across the UK as some will have to face the stark choice between eating or heating their homes.

But the idea that we cannot afford to tackle the climate crisis in the midst of a cost-ofliving crisis is not true in fact the two issues can go hand in hand. The truth is that there are significant things that we can do to tackle these crises in tandem. And it is becoming obvious we cannot afford to delay action on the climate any longer.

There is a myth that going green will cost us more – that a green lifestyle is always more expensive, and that it will cost you more.

It is true some solutions do cost more upfront than the average person can pay but once in place would lead to significant savings – ground-source heat pumps for example. If people can be helped with the upfront costs, the 'climate solutions' will be adopted faster, and the savings will help with the costof-living crisis.

To take another example, a comprehensive home insulation plan funded by the moving away from fossil fuels towards renewable energy will make us less dependent on the rocketing cost of fossil fuels on the international market. We are not as dependent on Russian oil and gas as other countries, but we are still vulnerable to the financial shocks of the increase of fossil fuels. Most forms of renewable energy can be delivered locally in many places around the UK solar farms, wind, and tidal energy in the North Sea for example. It is also an emerging industry which will create skilled well-paid jobs a lot of which could be in areas which historically have been areas of high unemployment and low wages. Phasing out fossil fuels is important if we are to keep warming as close to 1.5 degrees as possible and moving away from fossil fuels will reduce both the cost of living and carbon emissions.

Finally, to some, access to green spaces may seem like a luxury when the nation is battling a cost-of-living crisis. However, we also know that nature has huge benefits for our mental health and wellbeing which was even more important during the Covid pandemic. Both local and central government need to work to restore and protect nature so that everyone, rich or poor, can access nature close to home. That will create more jobs in the green sector and increase our carbon storage capacity.

All these things will help with the so-called levelling up agenda allowing as I say for well-paid skilled jobs and all the housing not being concentrated in the South destroying all the green spaces and concreting over all areas of natural beauty.

Going green will not just help us to avoid catastrophic climate change – I think it can and will save money and create a fairer and better future for everyone.

The intergovernmental panel on climate change report released in April 2022 said that limiting warming to 1.5 degrees requires global greenhouse gas emissions to peak before 2025 at the latest and to be reduced by 43% by 2030; the clock is ticking and we can't afford to wait until the cost of living crisis is over. We must act now to find solutions for both. The burden cannot be placed on those who have to decide between eating or heating and cannot be delayed for our children to deal with as by that time it will be too late. The government both national and local must lead the way and use its legislative and tax powers, and budgets, to make it easier and cheaper for ordinary people to do the right thing for the environment. After all we only have one world and we have to look after it.

The most valuable thing in the world?

What kind of gift do you give to a new Queen? What would you describe as the most valuable thing in the world?

We've thought a lot about the Queen in this Platinum Jubilee year. And I was reminded of one more story about her, as we prepared for the annual Year 6 leavers' service at the Coombes School.

During her Coronation Service in Westminster Abbey, just after the Queen had made her Coronation oath, the then Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland stepped forward and presented her with a Bible.

'We present you with this Book,' he said, 'the most valuable thing that this world affords. Here is Wisdom; This is the royal Law; These are the lively Oracles of God.'

That's quite a claim! 'The most valuable thing that this world affords': not money, or land, or titles. Nothealth, or long life. Not a happy family or good friends. But a book. And not just any book, but the Bible.

So there are two things I'll remember about this year's leavers' service at the Coombes. One was the heat. Nearly 40 degrees – it was sweltering. But the other was the privilege of giving each of the children who were leaving a personally-inscribed Bible of their own as a gift from our churches. And being able to tell them that they were being given the best gift that, all those years ago, the Queen had been given too.

It is an extraordinary thing to say. But the Bible itself isn't shy about saying something similar. It is, it claims, the very word of God himself. 'If you want to know God, read me!' it's saying. That was certainly the way Jesus saw the Bible too. Which is why that book has played such a central role in the life of the church down through the centuries, and is still at the centre of everything we do at Barkham Church today.

Most of us have Bibles somewhere, lurking on a shelf. Might it be that they're worth another look?

Maybe you're not so sure. But if you won't let me persuade you, how about the comedian Lee Mack?

A few years ago now, he was the guest on 'Desert Island Discs'. It got to the bit at the end of the programme when he was told he'd be given a copy of the Bible and the Complete Works of Shakespeare to take with him to his island. 'I'm glad you get the Bible,' he said, 'because I'd read the Bible.'

And then he went on: 'I think it's quite odd that people like myself, in their forties [NB It was a few years ago], are quite happy to dismiss the Bible, but I've never read it. I always think that if an alien came down and you were the only person they met, and they said, "What's life about? What's Earth about? Tell us everything," and you said, "Well, there's a book here that purports to tell you everything. Some people believe it to be true; some people don't believe it's true" and they said "Wow, what's it like?" and you go, "I don't know, I've never read it," it would be an odd thing wouldn't it?'

Don't you think?

So why not pick up a copy and see? Or even come along and join us at Barkham one Sunday? Join us in asking questions and listening to the book that claims to be the most valuable thing in the world. As ever, you'd be very welcome indeed!

Litter Picking

After reading the previous newsletter, which was very interesting and had a two-page article by Councillor John Kaiser on litter and its effects, I thought I'd write an article about being a 'litter picker' locally.

I joined Wokingham Borough Council's Adopt a street scheme just over a year ago.

The council provides volunteers with a litter picker (helping hand), green Adopt a Street bags and high visibility jackets. The idea is to keep the area green and litter free. As I do a daily walk anyway, one day a week, I do the litter pick, often by myself and sometimes with my good friend Madeleine. We usually do the same circular walk each time we do the litter pick, it's about 2 miles. By the end of the walk, we've usually collected two sacks of litter which will nearly always include drink tins, wine bottles, tissues, sweet wrappers, cigarette packets, plastic bottles, receipts and numerous other items! The Adopt a Street scheme sacks can be placed outside on refuse collection days and are collected along with other rubbish and recycling.

We often have people coming up to us and asking about it, so this is my opportunity to let Barkham residents know what we are doing. Further, doing this with a child occasionally will help to educate the next generation. Tribute to Stewart Richardson

As many of you are aware Stewart was a very active member of the Barkham community and a key committee member of the Barkham Village Residents Association (BVRA) for over 20 years. In 2001 he saw an article in the BVRA Newsletter seeking a Membership Secretary. Despite his heavy work commitments, he volunteered and carried out that role for 5 years.

When the BVRA's Newsletter Editor resigned in 2007 Stewart switched over to that role which he carried out for 11 years. When, in 2012, the Chairman of the BVRA resigned and moved away from the village Stewart agreed to be Acting Chairman, in addition to his role as Newsletter Editor, until a new chairman could be found. In fact, this 'Acting' role lasted for seven years! Stewart and his wife, Louise, supported many of the BVRA's social events and since photography was one of his hobbies, he became responsible for many of the photos in the Newsletter.

The Chairman had traditionally organised the BVRA's Carols In



The Park open-air carol concert in December each year. Stewart enthusiastically took that on that role too, liaising with Berkshire Youth Orchestra and acting as compere at the event – aka "Mr Megaphone"! He also helped with the Easter Egg Hunt.

In 2018 he retired from the Newsletter Editor and Chairman roles, only to take on the Development Watch role. This involved working with the Barkham Parish Council to track and investigate planning applications and alert Barkham residents so that they could send comments to the Wokingham Borough Council planning department. Stewart brought his management and computer skills to bear in all of his many roles.

Stewart and Louise loved their garden. He was proud of his collection of cannas and had promised to write an article about them for the Newsletter. Sadly, this never came to fruition. They also enjoyed rambling and meeting up with friends in London for theatre outings. They loved their holidays and made

exotic long-haul trips as well as to European destinations.


Stewart loved quizzes and he, Louise and their neighbours had a strong team in the BVRA annual quiz for many years. Alan's Patch

In the Spring edition I commented that we have had little rain in April followed by a downpour in early May. Gardeners were already complaining about it being a dry Spring! Since then, it's rained a couple of times in June but since the beginning of July virtually nothing. Records are being broken and hosepipe bans being imposed, drawing comparisons with 1976 for those of us old enough to remember. Unlike 1976, some might say that we don't even have a functioning government to be able to appoint a Minister of Rain!

Despite the drought we are currently experiencing it's been a very good year for growing. The grass in my field was the tallest it's ever been, about five feet tall in places. The grass was tinder dry so with the risk of fire in mind, I brought forward the annual mowing from early September to the middle of July. The tractor and mower that I normally hire were out of action so they provided a larger set up and that was much more fun to drive and I completed the task more quickly. It even had a hydraulic bucket at the front which I used to move some fallen timber!

Most things have grown well. There seem to be plenty of potatoes, the foliage has now died back. I'm particularly pleased with the way the seed-sown shallots are progressing. The pea netting worked well and kept the pigeons away. The various beans have enjoyed the hot weather. I've been freezing surplus broad, French and runner beans.

Despite the drought I have watered very little. The deep-rooted plants such as carrots and parsnips and even Swiss Chard can manage perfectly well without any help. Recently, I have started watering some of the leafy and shallow rooted crops such lettuce, sweet corn, Autumn raspberries and French beans.

I collect rain from the greenhouse roof and the new automatic drip-feed watering system inside works pretty well but given the intensity of the heat it needed to be supplemented by occasional manual watering. Of course, the collection tanks have now run dry so I've had to top up with mains water.

In the greenhouse I'm getting a great crop of tomatoes. The aubergine and chilli plants are





the best I've ever grown, so hopefully there will be a good crop in due course. Cucumbers are only just starting to crop as I had problems getting the plants started and needed a second batch. Earlier, I had good crops of radishes, carrots and cabbage.

The biggest disaster so far was a visit from the badgers which demolished half my sweet corn plants! I can't see where they got in but I have created some bar-



riers that have so far protected them from further attack. Another keen gardener in the village has suffered the same fate!

It's looking like a great year for apples and pears. The apples are ripening very early. Even some of the main crop are ready to eat. Pictured are some pickings from my early tree, Discovery.

I often moan about the gooseberry sawfly however since the crop was picked in June I've had very little damage. Perhaps this is because the deterrent of broad beans growing alongside them worked or, more likely, the drought has been a problem for the sawfly, perhaps making the leaves a bit tough to eat.

My peach tree, now about four years old is starting to produce a decent crop.









Social Matters

It seems like not time at all since the last social report, when the gardens were looking fresh, green and colourful, and we were hoping for a nice Summer. Well, we've had more sunny and very, very hot days than we really wanted or expected, and now, as we cope with record temperatures, and watch our plants shrivel up in these dry conditions you must be hoping, like me, for some rain very soon to save our gardens. Going to the coast has been the best place to be, with a dip in the sea!

Since the last newsletter there have been two events, the first being the Jubilee Fun Day on June 4th at the Village Hall. This was jointly organised by the BVRA and the Barkham Parish Council. After a slightly damp start the day was warm and sunny, and many people and families came and joined in the fun to listen to the Breakaway Brass Band, see displays, events and children's games and races. There were refreshments supplied by the Barkham Ladies, with tea, cof-







fee, soft drinks and a wonderful selection of cakes and cookies available all day. The Ladies were kept very busy indeed! The whole event was a great success, and the Queen's Jubilee Celebrations did bring people together it seems.



The second event was the Annual Distributors' BBQ, when the BVRA provided a BBQ and drinks evening on Sat 6th August at the village hall. It was a wonderful Summer's evening with 42 people enjoying the chicken, burgers and sausages, all cooked by our great chefs - Jim, Simon and Peter - we thank them very much. This is the annual event to say 'thank you very much' to all the distributors who deliver the Newsletters 4 times a year, as they do a sterling job.

We were all outside until well after sunset and so thankful that this year's BBQ had been wonderfully sunny and warm, unlike last year's deluge when we all had to be inside!

Our next planned event is the Family Skittles Evening on Saturday September 24th at the village hall. Wild about The Coombes


This is the first of a series of regular articles about The Coombes, an area of woodland spreadingbetween the parishes of Barkham and Arborfield. As you may have read in the 'BVRA – 35 years and still counting...' article in the last Newsletter, it was the threat of a major development within the Coombes in the 1980s that prompted a campaign of resistance that in turn led to the formation of our BVRA.


As the introductory article, I thought I should just set the scene. So to get your bearings, I shall cover the rights of way surrounding and through the Coombes. Map 1 below is taken from the Coombes Circular Walks sheet that can be downloaded from the Barkham Parish Council website at https://bit.ly/3SYRKQq



The Coombes lies within the surrounding public highways of Bearwood Road, Barkham Road, School Road and the B3030, which comprises Sindlesham Road and Mole Road. Between these roads is a network of other public rights of way that access and pass through the Coombes, many of which are highlighted with black dotted lines on the Coombes Circular Walks map.

Map2(right) showing these rights of way, covers the same area and is taken from the Wokingham Borough Council 'My Nearest' interactive map. The general public are only entitled to use the footpaths, shown in orange, as pedestrians, meaning on foot, mobility scooters or wheelchairs. The bridleways, in blue, may be used in the same way as footpaths and also used for cycling and horse riding. The byways, in red, may be used with any kind of transport.





There was a massive increase in people using the Coombes for exercise during the COVID-19 lock-downs. While unable to pursue their usual activities outside the home, many sought places to stretch their legs and get some fresh air. Being accessible from so many directions, the Coombes was an obvious place to explore, and I noticed quite a few copies of the Coombes Circular Walks being clutched by other walkers during that period.

As the lock-down continued, it was also noticeable how many

young puppies were being brought to the Coombes for their exercise and early training. For them, at least, the amenity value of the Coombes was not going to be a short-lived experience.

It is often imagined that the Coombes is a publicly owned space. In fact it is all privately owned. The Council's main responsibilities for it are to make sure that planning restrictions are adhered to and that the public rights of way remain passable and safe. So that is a brief introduction to the Coombes. I have a whole variety of topics up my sleeve to share with you in future editions of the Newsletter. These include its history, planned and unplanned occurrences, the wildlife and ecosystem, official recognitions and protections, and its impact on climate change.

I am passionate about the place and the wildlife that inhabits it. And like those campaigners in the 1980s, I get wildly incensed by things that threaten its future. I am wild about the Coombes!

Thefts of high value keyless vehicles

To help prevent thefts and ensure your car or van is not an appealing target for a thief, we are asking you to please be extra vigilant and consider your vehicle security.

- Fit a steering wheel stop lock as a physical deterrent. Some models can link to pedals and gear sticks.
- Ensure your vehicle is securely locked - electronic devices can be used to jam the electronic signal from your key fob to lock your vehicle. Always manually check your vehicle has locked before walking away. Scan the immediate area for anyone hanging around. If you feel their presence is suspicious, make a note of their description and report it on www.thamesvalley.police.uk , call 101 or 999 if you believe a crime is in progress.
- Keep your key fob safe and away from windows and doors when at home. Turn off the fobs wireless signal (check your vehicle manual to see if this is possible or contact your vehicle manufacturer) Use a signal-blocking pouch/case or a secure metal container to store your fob and any spare fobs.
- Look out for your neighbours when they are not home. If you see or hear anything suspicious around houses with keyless vehicles in your area then please let us know on www.thamesvalley.police.uk or by calling 101 or 999 if you believe a crime is in progress.

Whilst driving in the UK you are not required to have your driving documents with you, so there is no reason to leave your registration document (log-book), insurance, MOT or Driving Licence in your vehicle. These had been programmed by Robert as less challenging to play which allowed us to spend the majority of rehearsals concentrating on the Tchaikovsky, which certainly paid off. It was an extraordinary experience to be part of, and one that we will remember for a very long time.

The provisional programmes for next season have been announced and look very exciting, with music by Beethoven, Dvořák, Sibelius and many others. Our Autumn Concert is on Saturday 26th November 7.30pm at The Old Gym, Wellington College, the concert is Vaughan-Williams' Symphony No.2 'The London'. V-W never intended to write a symphony but was encouraged to do so by his composer friend, George Butterworth who was killed in WW1 and to whom the symphony is dedicated.
