The Way to Deliver New Homes and Barkham Square

I believe the only way to deliver the 350,000 new homes required per annum across the UK by government is to build new towns rather than trying to squeeze more and more into existing settlements. To do this we need to look to the past and the post war era when the number of homes needed were delivered. This would allow a policy of infrastructure first rather than the current policy which means roads services and communities facilities follow on. This causes chaos to existing residents and those who have moved into the new homes during the various phases of build. As a result, all residents live on a building site with unfinished roads and a lack of local services such as shops and schools for years.

In the late 1940s, 50s and 60s New Towns and Garden Cities were outside of the then existing planning system. Instead, they were under the New Town Development Corporation which had substantial strategic powers for land purchase and development planning. New TownDevelopmentCorporations had powers to acquire, own, manage and dispose of land and

property, undertake building operation, provide public utilities such as roads and generally do anything necessary to develop the new town.

These corporations enjoyed exceptionally favourable arrangements for land purchase at existing (or close to existing) use values and were effectively able to acquire all land needed to build the new towns.

The very strong land acquisition, infrastructure provision, planning and especially house building powers of the Development Corporations were very effective in delivering the UK's new towns in the right places. If the government is committed to delivering the number of homes needed in UK it could be that these powers should be vested in local authorities, especially where there is a history of housing delivery underperformance or a lack of a five-year land supply.

The standard approach to development in the Netherlands and Germany has been for the municipality to buy undeveloped land, provide the necessary infrastructure and services, parcel it into lots and sell them at prices that recover the costs involved. The sites are then developed by private companies, housing associations and individual owner-occupiers including self-build. In Germany, 'land readjustment' in preparation for development is one of the main instruments in local planning.

To rely on the current model of land supply and the flawed housing delivery model is folly and will never deliver the number of homes the government aspire too, or the people need. At the same time in an effort to deliver the numbers current policy requires will destroy existing towns and villages. Developers will take the easy route by squeezing in more and more homes into existing towns and villages, connecting them to already over loaded utilities and services without the necessary infrastructure.

This leads me onto the update of the Wokingham Borough's Local Plan and Barkham Square. Barkham Square was submitted by developers for upwards of 1,000 houses in the call for sites as part of the Local Plan Update process. It was subject to consideration as one of the three sites prioritised for early investigation in the council's plan, the other sites being Ruscombe and Grazley. This was back in July 2018. Since that time the council have changed their mind and have decided to put all 300 sites submitted up for consultation before moving forward with the preferred sites which will then come out of the full consultation.

It is quite possible that this mean Barkham will still get on to the preferred list once the consultation has been completed and evaluated. My view is Barkham Square does not work. The suggested highway infrastructure does not work, it is very much landlocked with no access to major transport communications and there is no way of delivering them due to the nature of its location. It is also outside the development red lines for the Arborfield Strategic Development Location (SDL). When the council presented its local plan for inspection in public back in 2010 the inspector made it clear he would not allow gaps between settlements. This was a term in the document which

the council requested to protect the country side and to allow each village settlement or town to retain its unique identity. The inspector's argument was that because we have red lines around our SDL's detailing the areas allocated for development it would be protection in itself. As you can see, by allowing SDL creep, which Barkham Square is, it removes that protection and would allow all the SDL's approved to grow and grow until we end up with one massive urban development running across the south of the borough from the M4 to the border of Hampshire.

Thirdly, we have seen a resident's petition presented to the council with over 4,000 signatures rejecting Barkham Square. This is the highest number the council has ever seen on a petition and so it is obvious to all that residents also believe it does not work and that there is no local support.

The council continues to plough through our current Local Plan, where over 12,000 permissions for new homes have been granted and less than 3,000 of those homes have been built across the borough. Of these there are less than 300 on the Arborfield site. Consequentially, the future disruption and congestion caused by development on such a massive scale should be clear to all. The saving grace is the first round of the council's Local Plan may have transformed parts of the borough, but, it has brought with it badly needed new roads, schools and services in addition to new homes. In the case of Arborfield a large percentage of the site was brown field land on the abandoned army facility.

If Barkham Square is allowed to go ahead not only will it mean another 5-10 years of residents (new and existing) living on a building site, it will mean more congestion and with it gridlock across the south of the borough.

I for one will continue to fight for Barkham Square to be removed from the Local Plan for all of the reasons above. Not least, I will support the residents of Barkham and help the council avoid the folly of following the path of SDL creep. I supported the original local plan as I could see the benefits of schools and roads and new communities with their own identities, but, enough is enough. If we wish to retain the identity of our Towns and Parish's and avoid infill across the borough the Local Plan Update must be strategy led. It should not be dictated to by random locations just because they are owned by or which developers have options on.

Which neatly brings me back to the start. New towns in suitable locations, supported by their own services and infrastructure are the only way to deliver the 350,000 homes across the UK that we are constantly told are needed.

The Petition - what happens next?

The petition regarding Barkham Square and other development in the area was finally presented to WBC with over 4,000 signatures. It was the largest petition of its kind to be presented to the Borough.

The promised debate took place on November 22nd. The council chamber was packed with members of the public and many councillors expressed strong support. Alas, at the end of the debate a motion was proposed and passed which merely supported the status quo without any attempt to put in train actions to remedy the concerns. WBC would just plough on with the Local Plan Update and make no commitment to lobby government about the unrealistic housing targets which the Borough faces.

After the debate, BPC submitted a formal letter of complaint. The newly appointed Leader of the Council, Julian McGhee Sumner, agreed to meet representative of BPC in January. This proved to be a constructive meeting, with the leader recognising the problems and agreeing to lobby government on housing numbers. Indeed, he

had already met with the prime minister to discuss local concerns about overdevelopment.

He also accepted that the conclusion of the debate had been mishandled and it would not happen again. Sadly, a similar fiasco occurred a few weeks later when another similar petition was presented! As a consequence, the Council is looking at framing new procedures: while I have little optimism that the proposals will help the process, it is clear that the political consequences must be striking home. In all, WBC has now received four petitions with a combined total of 10,000 signatures and to emphasis the point, the Conservative candidate was trounced at the recent Evendons by-election.

In the meantime, we must all await the next steps in the Local Plan Update. The latest round of consultation has just been completed and we must wait to see what is proposed for the "Preferred Options" which are scheduled to be published in the autumn. This will lead to another consultation before the year is out. With the matter of Barkham Square still in play (see John Kaiser's article), this could be the most important that Barkham has ever seen.

Incidentally, BPC's own response to the last consultation is published on the Barkham Parish website.

Neighbourhood Plan – the next hurdles

The Steering Group has been in discussion with WBC regarding the Neighbourhood Plan. The purpose of the discussion is to ensure compliance with national and local planning policies.

Some detailed changes to the Neighbourhood Plan are being finalised. It is expected that final documents will be completed very soon.

It had been anticipated that the Plan would go to the WBC ExecutiveinFebruaryforapproval as a consultation document. However, WBC have reviewed this in the light of local elections in May, and the associated "purdah" period that starts on 26 March. There is a long lead-time on Executive meetings, and it would have been necessary to have the plan and all supporting documents ready well before Christmas to meet the deadline for the February meeting.

WBC have therefore proposed that the plan be considered by their Executive in June, with consultation in July/August (perhaps lengthened in view of summer holidays), and an **Examiner appointed concurrently** with the consultation. It would then be possible to present the Examiner with all the documents shortly after the consultation ends, probably in September. Subject then to a successful examination it is likely that the Neighbourhood Plan would go to referendum in early December.

It is frustrating that the timetable has become so prolonged, but this is outside the control of the Steering Group. Planning is a long winded process!

The Coombes

Activities in The Coombes are causing enormous concern to residents. The sale of a dozen or so small parcels of land near Coombes Lane has led to trees being felled, undergrowth removed and the construction of a timber building intended as a dwelling.

I would like to record the excellent work done by the BVRA Development Watch, which has allowed many residents to pass on their observations to WBC. I also commend WBC for being quick to act and that they have already put in train court proceedings and served the necessary legal notices.

But sadly, as mentioned earlier, planning is a slow process and quick fixes are rare, especially in matters of enforcement where the legal procedures are extremely cumbersome. The final dénouement, I fear, is still a long way ahead.

Alan's Patch

Last summer is now a distant memory but as I write we are in a relatively warm period after the snow but I dare say there are more cold snaps to come. At least the increasing day length cheers us up and we are seeing the first signs of Spring. I went on an organised walk last week in Boxford near Newbury to see the fantastic display of snowdrops there.




Nearer home, we've still eating butternut squash, shallots, carrots, parsnips, spinach, leeks and a few beetroots. As reported last time the dry summer meant I had a poor main crop of potatoes

I have set up the seed potatoes for this year in egg boxes by a window to 'chit' them-get sturdy (green) shoots rather than long thin (white) ones.

and had to buy a sack to see us through to Spring. Also I have just run out of apples because many were attacked by codling moths, the maggots of which tunnel into the apples and ruin them. I am taking more counter measures this season to try and combat them. A winter wash was the first action, to kill off some of the bugs hibernating on the trees themselves.

I have finished pruning the fruit trees and checked that all the cordons are tied in securely.

In the greenhouse I cleared out everything, washed inside and out and finally I fumigated it to get rid of any hibernating bugs. Inside the propagator some tomato seeds have germinated so I have set up the automatic overhead lights to increase the day length so as to encourage the grow of sturdy plants.



leaves and added them to the leaf cage on top of last year's which had not rotted owing to the hot dry summer. They just about fitted, well, after jumping up and down on top of the cage! They have now compressed to two-thirds of the original height so are hopefully rotting away slowly.
