Faster broadband for all?

Many residents want faster Internet access for business or entertainment according to the results of the Barkham and Arborfield Neighbourhood Plan questionnaire. This will surprise those in the area who already have high speed broadband, but Barkham is a divided community when it comes to high speed access.

If you are connected to the Arborfield exchange, as many of us are, you will know that speed can be extremely variable and high speed merely a dream. The answer is a costly upgrade to Arborfield Exchange, but this isn't seen as economic by the providers.

Berkshire will have access to funds for subsidising upgrades, but it will only happen in areas where sufficient residents show that they want 'superfast broadband'. So, if you are affected you should register your interest in faster broadband at www.SuperfastBerkshire.org.uk/register. It doesn't commit you to anything or any provider, but it will make all the difference to the outcome.

News from Your Parish Council

Thank you to all those residents who took the trouble to complete the Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire, we are now busy analysing your responses.

The survey seeks to get answers from local residents on key questions that affect the area including the need for affordable housing, comments on local transport and the impact of the proposed development at Arborfield Garrison. Analysing the questionnaires will be just the first step in producing a Neighbourhood Plan. As the Plan evolves, there will be further consultation with local people. The final Plan will then only be adopted after a referendum for all residents. [There is a separate article by Laurence Heath on the Neighbourhood Plan responses on page 6 – Ed]

Within the next couple of weeks a new footpath will be ready for use. This new path will link into the present Barkham footpath no. 10 which runs from behind St James Church, the path will cross two fields and enter Rooks Nest Wood which is off Barkham Ride. This will give walkers a longer route when starting from Rooks Nest Wood and the opportunity to visit the beautiful church of St James. As soon as the path is ready for use the Parish Council hope to have some maps available for residents to use.

For any residents who are new to the area, did you know that the Parish Council pay for a refuse lorry once a month, it is situated at the top of The Junipers next to the park on 4th Saturday of every month (except December) from 8.00-11.00 am. This facility is for any bulky household waste that is too big for a normal collection, the driver is only too pleased to help you unload your car. No commercial waste please. The next date will be 24th November and then 26th January. All dates are published on our web site, www.barkham.parishcouncil.net

The Parish Council also have a history book "Barkham A History" written by two of our local historians, David French and Janet Firth. If you are looking for a Christmas present for a friend or relative who has an interest in local history this could be the very thing. The cost is £5 and they can be purchased from the Clerk.

Excellent response to Neighbourhood Plan survey

Barkham and Arborfield Parish Councils can now start to prepare a detailed Neighbourhood Plan thanks to those who responded to the questionnaire delivered to every household in September.

In total there were 367 responses – just over 14% of all households, which I am told is a very good response for this kind of survey. The data is being analysed and the early results show that residents in both parishes are keen to keep their own identities and are concerned about the impact of the proposed redevelopment of Arborfield Garrison.

Detailed analysis will reveal more about residents' priorities as well as giving a breakdown by location, age groups and employment status.

The results will provide the basis for developing a joint Neighbourhood Plan for Barkham and Arborfield. Any plan has to go through a rigorous process that culminates in a referendum, so the two communities still have quite a bit of work to do and residents will be asked to play a part at every stage.

We will be keeping all residents up to date with the results, but here are the headlines so far:

There is almost total unanimity that the identities of Arborfield and Barkham as distinct communities should be maintained (97% of responses) and that green gaps should be preserved between the villages and neighbouring communities (99%).

There is a similar high level of agreement that if the development of the Arborfield Garrison relies on local residential roads it would be detrimental to the environment of the villages through increased noise, pollution and safety concerns (97%).

Fewer than a third of residents actually live in the area because it is near to work (27%) and the average journey to work is roughly 30 minutes.

Unsurprisingly the majority of journeys to work are by car (78%, rising to 85% including car share and car/train options).

Bus services are not used at all by over half of respondents, with shopping cited as the most popular reason (20% of all respondents).

Residents are keen on cycling for leisure and exercise, but safety is considered the main problem both by cyclists and non-cyclists (91%).


There is support for an Arborfield by-pass (55% if it is at least a mile from the village, with an additional 16% accepting one nearer the village). It is likely that further analysis will show that support will be higher amongst Arborfield residents.

There is a difference of opinion

about what should be done at Barkham Bridge. Nearly half believe it should be widened (49%) but the same percentage would prefer traffic calming or no change. Further analysis may well reveal that Arborfield residents would prefer widening, but Barkham residents would not. This will be a tricky point to resolve!

There were mixed messages regarding affordable housing. There was a fairly even split between support (38%) and opposition (39%) with the remainder in the "don't know" camp. Only 17% of respondents identified a need within their own households. This will require further research, for example whether there are different requirements for social and rented housing, or low cost housing for sale. Ultimately this should influence the mix of housing at Arborfield Garrison.

Unsurprisingly, there was a wide range of responses to the need for new facilities within the redevelopment of Arborfield Garrison. The top preferences were: a doctors' surgery (48%), primary school (45%), secondary school (41%), dentist (41%), indoor sports hall (28%) and local shops (27%).



The question regarding open spaces produced strong support for footpaths (71% of top three responses) and cycleways (63%). Other support was for allotments (30%), bridle ways and wildlife refuges (both 23%), and jogging tracks (21%).

The existing open spaces appear well appreciated, especially The Coombes (80%); Arborfield Park (62%); and Junipers Field (48%). No doubt the last two will have much higher scores within their own communities.

The top two preferences for reusing the Listed Buildings forming Arborfield Garrison stable block are a café/restaurant (38%) or museum (31%). A combination of the two would seem a good compromise!

Finally, the most important challenge facing the community was considered to be traffic congestion (84% of top three responses), followed by development (45%), traffic speed (41%), protection of open spaces and green gaps (40%), and traffic noise (37%).

The results confirm that many of the area's problems are related to transport and development. In particular the communities will expect that any development at Arborfield Garrison is accompanied by the provision of the necessary road infrastructure.

Although we are very much dependent on our cars, there is a latent demand for cycling opportunities which can only be resolved by provision of safe cycle routes. Walking is very popular and our open spaces are appreciated: there is a clear desire to preserve our countryside and the important green gaps. These

are important themes that must be explored further as the Neighbourhood Plan evolves.

Thanks again to all respondents. The Neighbourhood Plan will endeavour to keep you updated as we make progress this important exercise.

In the last year we helped 4,592 new people with 10,157 new problems. There were 100 residents of Barkham, who visited us 230 times with 221 new problems. It cost us £4,500 (of which Wokingham Borough Council contributed £3,870) to help those Barkham residents.

Wokingham Borough is supposed to be one of the wealthiest places in the country to live. However, we know that there are some areas of severe deprivation in the borough. For example around 25% (approx 1150) of the people we saw were unemployed and looking for work and around 36% (1653 people) had a monthly household income below £1000.

We saw 75 people homeless people during the year (a rise from 56 the year before). Some were sleeping rough, but most in LA Bed & breakfast accommodation. People staying with friends / relatives (often called 'sofa surfers') amounted to 345 people or families for the year. That is a total of 420 homeless people, or families that came to us during the year. It was 330 the year before. Let us hope this particular trend does not continue.

What's happening at Wokingham Borough Council

Plans have been moving forward on the town centre regeneration and the outline has been consulted on and work should start in 2013. The plans are available for anyone to look at either at the council offices or on line on the council's website.

The council has been looking at the future of library services in the Wokingham Borough. To this end the council has been working with interested parties in a competitive dialogue process to see if there are ways that we can work with the private sector to improve the library service we offer. The result is that we haven't been convinced there will be enough benefits for our library users to continue with the process. We also don't want to take the risk the key objectives would not be achieved for residents.

We are committed to providing a good library service and are one of the few councils who have recently opened a new library. We want to make sure our libraries continue to meet the needs of local communities and will be work to explore options to improve the service. This will include looking at how we can link in or work

with other services such as sports, leisure and culture.

I have been working on the working party to deliver the new primary school provision strategy which was agreed by the executive at the end of October. The strategy will create additional places through new school provision between 2013 and 2016 at a number of sites across the borough, as well as put into action a priority programme of works to deliver 150 new places for 2013/14.

A new foot path is available to Rook Nest Wood, it links into the present Barkham footpath number 10 which runs from behind St James Church, the path will cross two fields and enter Rooks Nest Wood which is off Barkham Ride

On Planning, Wokingham Borough has lost the appeal made by Reading University with regards to the Shinfield Strategic development location and we are yet to understand the full implications and as I write and we are busy looking at the judgement which runs to over 300 pages.

There is no question when dealing with developers all the I's need to be dotted and T's need to be crossed in addition our planning guidance must be evidenced based to ensure we only get well designed sustainable developments.

With the Government's approach of preference for development driven by the economic woes of the UK it becomes even more important we all voice our opinions at the earliest stage possible; it is too late when they are laying the bricks.

Iforone will be fighting Barkham's corner to ensure we keep our identity as a village and defend it from unsuitable planning which will put unacceptable strains on infrastructure and destroys the very reason why most of us have chosen to live in Barkham.

We are still waiting for information with regards to the planning at the Garrison.

The development may be called Arborfield but nearly two thirds of development falls in Barkham. So what happens at the Garrison is important to us all.



Understanding Computers!



Barkham Resident Celebrates Publication of Debut Crime Novel



Harry Dunn, a Barkham resident for twenty five years has had his debut crime novel, Smile of the Viper, published by Caffeine Nights.

It is a fast paced thriller featuring London private investigator Jack Barclay who is on the trail of a crooked financier. The hunt takes Jack to the Latin Quarter of Paris and then Mexico before the dramatic climax in London. As he takes on the Russian mafia, he uncovers a nightmare world of betrayal and murder, putting his own life in danger. In the grand tradition of the genre, it has a completely unexpected twist at the end.

Harry spent many years with the BBC and travelled on promotion tours with the likes of Delia Smith and Keith Floyd. It was during the many weeks spent in hotels, he began reading novels and crime was always his genre of choice. 'Keith Floyd once said: You know enough about it all. You should write your own novel.

Yea, Lord, we greet thee

Christmas at St James' Church

Back when we were just coming to St James, before I started working here, I had no idea just how busy Christmas could be. The two weeks running up to Christmas Day are – without a doubt – the busiest of the year, but in many ways they are the most exhilarating too.

One of the privileges of being part of the local community is being able to welcome different groups into the church for their own Christmas activities. Every year Barkham Pre-School make their way across the car park from the Village Hall for a very simple retelling of the Christmas story (and a cup of tea and a mince pie for the helpers and mums who come too). The Coombes School Carol Service alternates between Arborfield and Barkham churches, and we very much look forward to having them back with us again this year as well.

Then there are the five main Christmas services we run each year. There's the Nativity, on the morning of the last Sunday before Christmas, when the children from our Sunday Club re-enact the events of the first Christmas. Our increasingly popular 'Carols by Candlelight' usually takes place on the Sunday evening before Christmas (although this year it will be happening on Sunday 16 December, a week earlier than normal). The candlelit church

looks stunning (and smells lovely too, thanks to the mulled wine we serve afterwards). Our musicians are already trying to work out how they can meet the annual challenge of trying to match the quality of what they did the previous year.

Things get very busy on Christmas Eve. The afternoon sees our all-age 'Family Carols,' which is traditionally our best attended service of all (standing room only in the last few years – and not much of that). It tends to be chaos, but it's wonderful to see so many gathering in this way. We've changed the time this year, from 3pm to 4pm, in the hope that this will better suit those with very young children, so it could potentially be very full indeed.

My favourite service (speaking personally) is our 'Midnight Carols,' at 11:30pm on Christmas Eve. It's very different—very thoughtful and calm—and deliberately so, in order to give people an opportunity to reflect. So—even if you know you won't be ready for Christmas Day by then, why not face up to the fact that you'll have to make it up as you go along on the day itself, leave the rushing around, and come and join us to pause and remember what this season is really all about?

Then it's home for just a few hours' sleep before we're back again for our Christmas Day Service at 10am, when regulars and visitors alike start the day by praising the God who gave us his Son.

There's one new feature in our Calendar this year. Wokingham Town Council have invited our friends at the Church at the White House to put on a Live Nativity (animals and all!) in central Wokingham on the afternoon of Sunday 23 December. That will be

ahuge undertaking and they need all the help they can get, which is why we've happily moved our Carols by Candlelight to Sunday 16 December, so we can help them with the Nativity instead. This means there won't be anything at Barkham Church on the evening of Sunday 23 December. But do listen out for details of the Live Nativity and hopefully we'll see some of you there.

And why all this activity?

The first verse of the first carol we sing at the service of Carols by Candlelight reminds us that the things we remember at this time of year aren't just a myth. They actually happened in space and time—'Once in royal David's city.' If we'd been there then, we'd have seen them too.

And the last verse of the last carol we sing at our Midnight Carols (hopefully just after midnight – if we've got our timings right!) reminds us who that baby was, and why he's worth remembering:

Yea, Lord, we greet thee, Born this happy morning; Jesus, to thee be glory given! Word of the Father, Now in flesh appearing!

Jesus said he was God himself, born as one of us, in order to save us.

That's a big claim! Why not take the time to look into it some more this Christmas? We'd love to welcome you to St James', and hope all our services will be helpful for those who just want to think more about these things.

But – if that claim is true – then surely there's only way to respond – and not just by remembering that baby.

O come, let us adore him!

The Green Deal costs of eco-refurbishment

The Green Deal has launched but are the costs of eco-refurbishment well understood? A number of basic factors influence the costs involved:

Scale and ambition of works Age, type and size of your home Grants, subsidies and incentives

Most projects start with improved insulation and draught-proofing and move to more efficient heating and windows. Solar and heat recovery systems may also be suitable, but radical carbon reduction could require all this and more.

The final cost will be driven by how green you want to go. Reducing a typical older home's carbon emissions by 80% will not be

cheap. One study by The Existing Homes Alliance puts the cost at between £12,000 and £54,000. If your budget is at the lower end, solar panels and external wall insulation are likely to be off the

Insulating older solid wall properties is challenging, especially if all your walls are exposed to the elements. But, if your property was built after 1930, it will probably have cavity walls. These can be insulated at little or no cost with an energy supplier offer.

Subsidies change over time so it is worth seizing a good deal. Modest grants are available for renewable heat technologies like solar thermal, biomass and heat pumps. The long awaited Renewable Heat Incentive is due in summer 2013. Green Deal finance packages are due in the New Year.
